Operational areas



1. Nutrition and Education Programme

The programme focuses on the most effective option of preventing and correcting malnutrition in children through the provision of milk and wellbeing activities to engage in the learning activities to impact their health and wellbeing from 6 months to 6 years with the support of JIV Daya Foundation



Nutrition activities: Conducted education activities to 202 Children of 5 Villages of Urladani Gram Panchayat and also provided Milk & Biscuits to 6 month to 5 years Children of the Village in 6 days a week.

Educational activities: Conducted 2 hours preschool activities to children for preparing Primary education also created awareness on Health and Hygienic i.e. appropriate Hand wash, use of Clean Clothes and concern to the body.

Parents & Children meeting: Organized 52 Meetings with parents & Children before beginning the Project & during the project period, so the community is engaged and understands the program and encourages children to participate in the activities regularly.

2. Adolescent Health Program

Seba Jagat is facilitating Adolescent Health Programme (Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram) in Balangir and Koraput district with the support of National Health Mission Balangir Odisha under public private initiative. The programme aims to improve the health and well-being of adolescents through a combination of developing physical and mental health and wellbeing, in educational institution-based programme and community outreach initiatives, providing them with essential information on topics such as reproductive health, mental well-being, nutrition, and hygiene.

- The block supervisors and ASHAs are taking initiatives to engage the peer educators more proactively for a better learning experience and the involvement of the participants. We hope this will help increase the attendance of the adolescent participants.



Impact

1. Enhanced Outreach and Access The Adolescent Health programs have successfully its their reach into remote and underserved rural areas, providing critical health services to adolescents who might otherwise go without.
2. Cultural Sensitivity and Inclusion: The programme has strategized for rural populations incorporating cultural sensitivity into its design and delivery, respecting local traditions and practices while educating about health. This approach has improved community acceptance and effectiveness of health initiatives.
3. Nutrition and Physical Health: The programs have focused on improving nutrition and addressing physical health issues common among rural adolescents, such as those arising from agricultural work and limited access to balanced diets. Initiatives often include education about nutrition and physical fitness.
4. School-Based Health Programs: Recognizing the central role of schools in rural communities the programs have successfully integrated health services and education within schools. This included the provision of sanitary facilities, clean water, and health education, which are crucial for keeping adolescents, especially girls, in school along with health education.
5. Mental Health and Resilience Building: Understanding the isolation and specific stressors faced by adolescents, the programs focussed on mental health support and resilience training to help young people cope with challenges such as economic hardship and limited social services.
6. Increased Access to Healthcare: Adolescent Health programs have significantly expanded access to healthcare services for young people, ensuring they receive necessary medical attention, vaccinations, and counselling especially in Shradhha Clinic.
7. Improved Sexual and Reproductive Health The programs have played a crucial role in educating adolescents about sexual and reproductive health, leading to reduced rates of unplanned pregnancies, sexually transmitted infections (STIs), and unsafe abortions.
8. Empowerment Through Education: The initiatives have promoted comprehensive sex education, empowering young people with the knowledge and skills to make informed decisions about their health and well-being which have developed in reducing early marriage.
9. Prevention of Substance Abuse It has implemented prevention strategies to reduce substance abuse among young people, including awareness campaigns, peer education, and support services for those struggling with addiction.
10. Community Engagement and Participation: It has actively engaged communities in promoting adolescent health, fostering partnerships between healthcare providers, schools, parents, and youth organizations to create supportive environments for young people.

3. Health and Wellness centre

3 Management of Health and Wellness Center PHC (N) in Public Private Partnership Program

Seba Jagat has taken the administrative responsibility to run and manage a Health & Wellness Centre, PHC (new) of Barabandha of M. Rampur Block, Bengaon of Lanjigarh block of Kalahandi district and also Lankagarh PHC of Tumudibandha block in Kandhamal District in private public partnership mode with the support of National Health Mission Odisha.

The people from around 38 villages of Barabandha and also the nearest Gram Panchayat, 33 villages of Bengaon GP and 118 villages other nearest GP of Kalahandi District, 36 villages of Lankagarh GP, and also the nearest GP of Kandhamal District depend on this centre for their primary and emergency services

Improved income in Green Gram+ Maize through Crop Diversification ”

Dumerguda is the one among the village of Damkarlakhunta GP under M. Rampur Block of Kalahandi district, Odisha having 122 families. The main occupation of the villagers is Pulses, Millet and Rice. Additionally, they depend on daily wages & collecting minor forest produces, selling directly in local market.

They are cultivated the Pulses i.e Black Gram, Green Gram, Horse Gram, Vegetables and rice in their existing land in traditionally basic only in rainy season and what are products they earned it is too difficult to manage their Families. No irrigation facilities in the area so the farmers are depend on rain water for farming.

Looking this kind of problem, towards improvement of income of farmers, the Special Program of Integrated Farming (SPPIF) was begin in this Gram Panchayat and oriented to the Farmers on Crops Diversification, Line Showing method, Cultivation method etc and said to farmers those who are interested to cultivate the Products they are apply for Incentive claim. So 67 Farmers of the Villages are agreed to cultivate the Green gram + Maize in line showing method for the in the year 2023-24.

Sri Pratap Patra is one of the farmer of Dumerguda Village. After got the Information of Crop Diversification program. He is interest to Green gram + Maize crop in their land i.e Plot No 4, Khata No ; 101, Total land in the area Is 0.4 Hectors. So he submitted the documents to the Concern CRP of the GP. So the CRP collected their Aadhar Copy, Land records, Bank Account Copy, Farmers ID etc and provided to Block Program Coordinator. After Approved the CDP Farmers List the Farmers are received the Seeds. Pratap also received the 6 kg 400 gram Green gram and 1 Kg 36 gram Maize from FPO. He is germinated the Crop in 8:1 Ratio in their land. By the use of Line showing method the plants are gowned properly. And lastly harvested 67 kg green gram and Rs. 6800 money by the selling of Maize in local markets. Around he earned about from Green gram crop = 67 kg X @ 100 per kg = 6700, Total Income = 13500/- . After seeds cost deduction he also assist of Rs. 7000 from Govt. of Odisha so he is said that, The Crop diversification process is a good way of pulses crop because we avoid the traditionally ways of cultivation and change the crop which are cultivate in a land in long time and enhance our income by this way.



Now they are interested to Cultivate the pulses in this crop Diversification method in regular basis. The farmers of the nearest village are also influence in this method and they are demand to add their village in this process. It is possible by the farmers Agriculture department of Block and Support of staff of the SPPF.

LOKNATH 'S JOURNEY IN AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT THROUGH SPPIF PROGRAM

In the fiscal year of 2023, Loknath Rana, a proactive villager from Antarla in the Madanpur Gram Panchayat, in M.Rampur Block embarked on an innovative journey in aquaculture, leveraging the support provided by the Special Programme for Promotion of Integrated farming Framework (SPPIF) program with the support of Seba Jagat(FA) and KFPCL(FPO) . This initiative aimed at enhancing the livelihoods of rural farmers through sustainable and integrated aquaculture and related agricultural practices

Loknath Rana, residing in the village of Antarla, had been a small-scale farmer with a keen interest in diversifying his agricultural practices. With limited resources and traditional farming as his primary income source, Loknath sought opportunities for growth and sustainability. The SPPIF program's came as a symbol of hope of hope for him, offering a chance to delve into aquaculture, a field he had little experience in.



Loknath was provided with quality fish fingerlings to stock in his small pond, a venture supported by the SPPIF program in the fiscal year 2022/23. The program's objective was to encourage integrated farming

among rural farmers as a sustainable source of income and nutrition. Loknath's selection was based on

his demonstrated commitment to agricultural innovation and his willingness to adopt new practices

Recognizing the importance of capacity building, the SPPIF program facilitated multiple training sessions on fish cultivation techniques, pond management, and sustainable fish farming practices. Loknath participated eagerly in these sessions, acquiring knowledge and skills critical for successful aquaculture.

Loknath's dedication and the application of best practices learned from the training bore fruit within the year. He successfully harvested 125 kg of fish, which he sold at a competitive rate of Rs 200/kg and earned Rs 25,000.00. This achievement not only marked a significant milestone in his journey into aquaculture but also showcased the potential for financial success through dedication and the application of sustainable practices.

In recognition of his successful venture into fish farming and his role as a model for sustainable agricultural practices in the community, the SPPIF program decided to further support LoknathRana in the fiscal year 2023/24. This time, he was provided with Indigenous Chicken Production Units and Trellises, aiming to diversify his agricultural activities further and enhance his income sources.

LoknathRana's journey from a traditional farmer to a successful agriculturist underlines the transformative potential of targeted programs like the SPPIF. His achievements have not only improved his family's livelihood but also served as a testament to the effectiveness of integrating sustainable practices in agriculture. Furthermore, his story inspires other farmers in the community to explore aquaculture and other diversified farming activities as viable options for income generation and sustainability

” LoknathRana's case study is a shining example of how dedicated individuals, when supported by thoughtful and well-implemented programs, can achieve remarkable success in sustainable agriculture. It highlights the importance of training, continuous support, and the willingness of farmers to embrace new technologies and practices. 3.c:SPECIAL PROGRAMME FOR THE PROMOTION OF MILLETS IN TRIBAL AREAS

Special programme for the promotion of millet in M. Rampur block is a flagship initiative of Government of Odisha. The programme aims comprehensive revival of millets in farms and plates to promote climate resilient farming and contribute to addressing micronutrient deficiency with improving livelihoods of vulnerable farmers in Rain fed Areas. The programme is implemented in 56 village of M.rampur Block with 1000 household.

The objectives include:

- 1.Increasing household consumption of millets
- 2.Revalorization of millet food cultures in urban and rural areas
- 3.Conservation and promotion of millet land
4. Promotion of post-harvest and primary processing enterprises on millets.
5. Improving productivity of millets-based crop systems.



Facilitating the millet markets

- Created 276 no of Awareness Campaign in 69 Villages in about production, Health benefits , consumption at Household Level and its marketing of of Millets,
- Participated 20 women farmers at 2 District level Special Programme and participated
- Promotion of local, Hy-yield varieties through Seeds Production.
- 20 Farmers are participated in 3 Residential training on system of millet intensification (SMI) to increase the production, Land Preparation, Selection of seed, Seed Rate for SMI, Seed Treatment, Raising of Seed Bed, Transplanting, Weeding system Etc.
- Organized the 4 Nos. . for CRP and progressive farmers training and discussed about the agronomic practices like four steps of farming.
- Organized 3 Food Festivals in project location where 160 participants participated and showed 50 types of dishes from millet. The SHG members explained the cultivation of millet, their motivation, its nutritional values, and how millet is helping them earn money
- Organized 6 program on the occasion of International year of the millet -2023 and created awareness among the students, grassroots service provider and farmers and others.
- 3 Harvest Festival organized at operational area about create awareness about Millet .

3.d: Orchard Plantation Program at Keonjhar District

The Orchard Plantation program began at Ghatagaom Block from Aug-23 by the support of District Mineral Foundation and Horticulture department of Keonjhar.

Basic points and activities done in this period

1.Beneficiary and Area Selection

222 farmers selected for orchard plantation from 8 Gram Panchayats of Ghatagaom Block by door to door visit and arranged Village level group meetings in the presence of local person PRI members and Farmers and discussed about the Project , Activities , support of farmers in this Orchard Plantation Program. .

2.Base line survey ; As per the target we have selected beneficiaries for achieve at 100-hectares land for orchard plantation for 1st year . Accordingly, our team focused on following steps-

- Selection of Beneficiary and area by organize the group discussion, village level meeting and individual follow up.
- Store the basic information in format
- Survey on DMF Link
- Document collection (Aadhar card, Ration Card, ROR, Bank Passbook, Job Card and Passport photo copy etc.)
- Geo tagging – land verify on Bhuvan and Bhunaksha



e1. Identified Patch Verification

Patch and document verification by technical expert and programme manager to ensure suitable land for orchard plantation. Verified and submitted 109.454 hectares of land belonging 14 patches from 12 villages for plantation.

Final patch verified by DDH, Keonjhar and AHO, Ghatagaon Block. Visited 12 numbers of villages from 8 numbers of Gram Panchayats and verified 14 numbers of patches. At the end of the verification finally we submitted 109.454 hectare of document to AHO.

1. Patch wise data update

ü Irrigation – ensure assured irrigation sources and finding what kind of water facility required for plantation.

ü Periphery Mapping- Mapping the boundary or periphery by using measurement apps. Measured periphery for fencing proposal.

ü Sketch map- Making sketch map for identify the patch boundary and separated planation plots.

Village Meeting- Conducted 94 village meetings and shared our proposal to 1245 farmers during FY 2023-2024 and Discussed on locality, area and their occupation, Visioning on approach of orchard plantation, orchard plantation project, schemes and benefits, Planed for income generation by doing orchard plantation and intercropping, beneficiary selection processes, Aware the rules and regulation of Organization and project and document collection and form fill up.

5.2. VDC Formation- 12 numbers of Village Development Committee formed in 14 numbers of patches and Discussed key points in VCD meeting: i.e Importance of Village Development Committee, Role and responsibility of VDC members, formation process, Bearing role of VDC in Orchard Plantation. Savings and Market linkages etc.

Discussed key points in this meeting i.e - Discussed about project objectives and target, process of Beneficiary data collection. Planed for achieve 100-hectare land for plantation at 1st year, month wise plan and review , Group discussion and village meeting. Process of VDC formation. Basic technique and idea share about plantation , Document collection process. Package of practice of plantation. Monthly reporting etc
